

Language Developmental Milestones

Language development can be categorized by age into developmental milestones and should be assessed for each individual child.

Infant Developmental Milestones

Infants communicate needs and wants through nonverbal gestures and facial expressions. They respond to environmental sounds and to talking, singing, and reading.

Age	Language Developmental Milestones
0-3 Months	Makes cooing sounds such as "ooo," "gah," and "aah?" Imitates sounds Laughs
4-7 months	Makes sounds when looking at toys or people. Makes sounds like, "da" "ga" "ka" and "ba" Makes high pitched squeals. Babbles
8-12 months	Responds and imitates sounds Makes two similar sounds like, "ba-ba" "da-da" or "ga-ga" Says words such as "mama," "dada" and "baba"



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Toddler Developmental Milestones

Toddlers demonstrate their understanding of simple words through their actions. They are experimenting with nonverbal vocal sounds and are beginning to use one or two word phrases.

Age	Language Developmental Milestones
12-24 months	Can say 15 words Correctly uses the words "me" "I" "mine" and "you" Says two words sentences such as, "see dog" or "all gone" Listens to simple stories Responds to adult questions
24-36 months	Repeats back two word sentences such as, "what's this" or "daddy play" Says first and last name Makes three or four word sentences Communicates through nonverbal gestures Listens and imitates sounds in songs or nursery rhymes Uses three to four word phrases



Language Developmental Milestones

Preschool Developmental Milestones

Preschoolers demonstrate an understanding of vocabulary through their everyday conversations. They can describe experiences in detail and can speak clearly enough to be understood.

Age	Language Developmental Milestones
36-48 months	Listens and follows multi-step directions with support Responds to complex questions with appropriate answers Speaks clearly enough to be understood Uses expanded sentence structure Retells personal events and experiences
48-60 months	Uses past tense words Uses comparison words such as heavier, stronger or shorter Extends/expands thoughts or ideas expressed Connects new vocabulary from activities, stories, and books with prior experiences and conversations Describes activities events and stories with detail
